## **Questions about the content:**

### 1. What was the best part of the guest lecture?

- "I thought that the writing tips were very relevant and I liked the backdrop of interesting science on which the writing was presented."
- "I found the "writing tips" aspect of the lecture to be of great value. Knowing that even successful writers encounter similar problems as myself was quite refreshing."
- "...seeing her writing process and understanding how the scientific writing process works. Also, the videos of the ants were pretty cool."
- "Her passion about her work and honesty of her writing process."
- "Using the draft examples to help us understand her writing process first hand."
- "Her passion; she was clearly in love with her profession and excited to share that enthusiasm with the class"
- "The speaker was able to take a topic on ants and actually make them sound very interesting."
- "The pictures and stories of other countries and species that I did not know existed"

# 2. Did this guest lecture change or complicate your perception about the role of writing in STEM disciplines? If so, how? If not, why not?

- "It opened my eyes to just how much writing is actually used in STEM disciplines and the importance of it."
- "The lecture caused me to see that writing plays an even bigger role than I had previously thought."
- "She changed my perception. I didn't realize STEM disciplines required so much writing"
- "The lecture reinforced ideas that have been discussed in our class."
- "This opened my eyes to how much writing there is but helped me feel like it is doable."
- "No, the guest clarified the role of writing in STEM rather than complicating it."
- "Yes, instead of thinking the first product has to be perfect, I know that it can be flawed and can ask for help."
- "Yes it helped me think of new ways to write my papers instead of just the traditional way we are taught."
- "Yes, I like her steps on how to write! I will probably use them."
- The lecture helped simplify the writing process for me by providing tips ..."

- "On average how much time a day does a STEM professional spend writing?"
- "How often do you have to write proposals?"
- "Is it difficult to find room for creativity?"
- "What is the most common type of writing used in STEM disciplines?"
- "What STEM discipline requires the least amount of writing?"
- "How does it vary among the disciplines within STEM?"

# 4. What do you perceive as the guest lecturer's greatest strength as a teacher?

- "She was able to engage all of us (...) through interactive activities and videos."
- "Passion. It was very clear how interested she is in her field and it helped to keep me engaged."
- "Making it interesting! She kept me focused the whole time."
- "Passion for ants. Will do a great job in her field."
- "Being extremely relatable and explaining everything thoroughly."
- "She was very engaging and approachable."
- "She brought her real life examples into the lecture to show the applications of scientific writing."
- "Her ability to hold the audience's attention and provide information in an easy-to-understand manner."
- "The visual aids were great and made it easy to follow along and more entertaining"
- "Giving examples of what she was describing, engaging the audience, giving visuals, easy to understand (word choice)"
- "She understood her presentation from our perspective which kept us involved and entertained"

## 5. What part of teaching could the guest lecturer work on?

- "Maybe going into more detail on certain topics."
- "Further explaining, expanding on the writing process"
- "Relating it more to us or our specific pieces of writing"
- "She could have exemplified her process to be broader instead of focusing on grant writing, i.e. give examples of field notes and her writing work."
- "Less emphasis on the complications of writing and more on how to successfully write"
- "Elaborating more on her specific field of study"
- "Nothing, it was great."
- "Nothing I can think of. Very good speaker!"
- "Nothing, enjoyed everything!"
- "It think it was a great lecture and I wouldn't change it."
- "Anywhere she so chooses; she did an excellent job."
